City Nature Challenge 2023: Pittsburgh Region



THE 2023 WORLDWIDE City Nature Challenge took place from April 28 through May 1. The Pittsburgh Region included Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Washington, and Westmoreland Counties. As shown in the above graphic, the Pittsburgh Region uploaded a total of 6,151 observations, including 1,231 different species (not just mushrooms).

Among WPMC officers. President Stephen Bucklin submitted 145 observations, Vice President Cara Coulter shared 95, and WPMC Secretary Julie Travaglini uploaded 67. To see more results, go to:

DR. BARRIE OVERTON is a professor of biology at Loch Haven University (now part of Commonwealth University of Pennsylvania), where he teaches Biology and Mycology courses. His areas of expertise include plant pathology, identification of wild edible mushrooms, and White-Nose Syndrome (WNS) in



WNS is a fatal disease, caused by Pseudogymnoascus destructans, a fungus that has devastated North American bat populations. At this year's Gary Lincoff Foray, Dr. Overton will talk about WNS and the new species of Pseudogymnoascus that he has found in Pennsylvania caves.

NOAH SIEGEL, one of the premier mushroom photographers in the nation, will present "Under Pressure: Evolution Oddities in the Fungal World". This lecture will highlight some of the fascinating traits which fungi have evolved due to environmental pressures, and the strive to get ahead in the fungal world.



Noah's field mycology skills are extensive—he has spent over three decades seeking, photographing, identifying, and furthering his knowledge about all aspects of macrofungi. He has hunted for mushrooms throughout the United States and Canada, as well as on multiple expeditions to New Zealand, Australia and Cameroon.

FELLOW MUSHROOM LOVERS, if you are planning to attend this year's Lincoff Foray, and you love to cook your favorite food (mushrooms!), now is a good time to think about bringing your signature dish to the Foray. You don't need to cook for 100 people - just 10 to 15.

If you plan to use wild-foraged mushrooms, you will need to first get them identified and approved by a WPMC Identifier or Mycologist. It's OK to use mushrooms that you bought at a store if you are uncomfortable with cooking wild mushrooms. In fact, your dish doesn't need to contain mushrooms at all; some members are allergic or sensitive to mushrooms and will need an alternative meal choice.

Anytime is the perfect time to think about what to bring, with so many delicious mushrooms all around us. We will also need volunteers to assist with setup, teardown, and other tasks. The Great Chaga Hunt

EDITOR'S NOTE: WPMC Mycologist John Plischke volunteered to lead the club's firstever Chaga Walk on July 1. For more information about Chaga, here's an article by John's mother that first appeared in a 2008 WPMC newsletter.

CHAGA – INONOTUS OBLIQUUS, Birch Conk, Chaga, or Clinker Polypore has been used in Russia as a folk medicine since the 16th century. It is used for the treatment of cancer, diabetes, and blood disorders, as well as for common stomach ailments such as gastritis, ulcers, and general pain. And it is antibacterial and antiviral. Nobel Prize winning author Alexander Solzhenitsyn credits Chaga with curing his cancer.

The Plischke Family (John & Kim, John & Becky) Chaga Foray started early one Friday morning. We were inspired by reading an article in the Minnesota Mycological Society newsletter. They went in winter and combined chaga hunting with cross country skiing. They say it is easier to see when there are no leaves on the trees. We were also inspired by the discussion on our Yahoo Groups last winter about chaga.

This June, John was giving 3 mushroom programs in northeast PA. That was the start of our adventure. We headed east on the PA turnpike, then northeast on I-81. All along I-81 we saw small white birch trees. We knew chaga is found on birch, but we were looking for larger trees. John III found our first chaga on a large yellow birch tree close to Nescopeck State Park. We were so excited because this tree had two large chaga mushrooms on it. They were bigger than softballs. Problem: They were about ten feet up in the tree. (Photo 1)

John found a large rectangular rock and rolled it over to the tree to stand on. We were determined to get that chaga. Problem: How do we get it off the tree? We had read in the Minnesota newsletter that they used hatchets. We used a hammer. John whacked it while standing on the rock. He didn't hit it that hard when it flew off. He hit the second chaga and off it came. (Photo 2)

The first one was sort of round and solid. The second was about the same size but horseshoe shaped and hollow. We were so excited to find these two beautiful chagas. We had read that you only find chaga on one out of 15,000 birch trees. Luckily there are a lot of birch trees in that area of PA.

Later that day, while driving up a winding country road, John shouted, "Stop the car!" This is a common occurrence during mushroom season in our car. We couldn't pull off the road, so we went on until we could turn around. Coming back down the steep hill, John & Kim got out and went after the next chaga.

This was another challenging one. It was too high up in the tree to reach. Kim found a long dead branch and they proceeded to use it to knock the chaga off the birch tree. They were successful. Another beautiful chaga to add to our collection!

Kim & John had to wait for us to turn around and come back up the hill to pick them up. What else was there to do while waiting for us? Why, look for more! There, on the base of a nearby birch, were 8-10 small chaga about the size of golf balls. Those were easily knocked off with a rock. They were the last chaga we found on the trip, although we did keep looking.

The next morning at breakfast, I broke off some of the black outer part and some of the golden center of one and made a cup of tea. I am a tea drinker, and it was very good. I read later that chaga tastes like a bitter coffee. I found no bitterness or coffee taste whatsoever. After breakfast we put all the chaga we found on the table to see how much we had. We were very pleased that on our first hunt we found three large and a lot of smaller ones. (Photo 3)

After coming home with our collection came the task of somehow grinding it to a size to make tea. We tried using a wood rasp. It produced a finely ground powder but was very time consuming. (Photo 4) We then, through trial and error, found that we could beat the chaga with a hammer into small pieces. (Photo 5) The next step was to get it











into even smaller pieces. I tried a food processor, but that didn't work too well. It kept getting stuck in the blades. So we tried an electric coffee grinder, and it did a great job of grinding the chaga into a fine powder. (Photo 6)

OK, now we have our chaga ground up, which we had to do to make tea. How do we make the tea? I decided to ask the experts. On Groups last winter there was a chaga tea discussion. I asked David Work of the Mid-Hudson Mycological Society how he made chaga tea. "I recommend breaking up the chaga into relatively small pieces, using about an ounce or two per quart of water. I simmer it for a couple of hours, cover it and let it steep for 4 to 6 hours then strain it and either hold it in the fridge for 3-4 days or freeze it and pull it out as needed." David also sent me a great recipe for a chaga chai tea.


I also asked David Spahr from Maine. He told me how he makes chaga tea. "I chop it into cubes and dry it, then grind it up into powder. Any of the black outer coating that seems loose and would easily fall rubbing it moderately in your hands I do not use. The rest I run through a grinder or hand crank gristmill. The tea is good if you brew it in a tea ball in the normal way. It can be mixed with other tea like chai, green tea or whatever you like. For medicinal effect, boiling for 2 hours or more is supposed to be best."

I asked Greg Marley, whose company Mushrooms for Health sells chaga tea and chaga chai tea. Greg said to grind up the chaga into small pieces. Boil 2 tablespoons of chaga in 2 quarts of water, then simmer for 20 minutes. The boiling brings out the medicinal qualities of the chaga. The chaga falls to the bottom of the pan, so you don't need to strain it. If you want, you can sweeten it with honey or any other sweetener you prefer. I did try it this way and it was very good. If you want to try chaga tea and can't find any in our area, you can contact Greg.

By the way, we have yet to find chaga in western PA. But they may be here. Keep a look out for an ugly looking black thing growing on a birch tree-you just may have found chaga.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Becky has made the following changes since 2008.

Now I break up the chaga using a sledgehammer with a flat bottom, instead of a hammer. I put the chaga in a flat bottom kitchen trash can that is dedicated only to chaga. When pounded, the chaga rarely flies out of the can. That gets the chaga small enough to grind. (Photo 7) The other thing that has changed is that I use a Cabela's meat grinder to grind the chaga into powder. It is fabulous! Again, the grinder is only used for chaga. (Photo 8) I also put the powder on trays to make sure it is dry before putting it in jars. (Photo 9)

ONCE AGAIN, WPMC Identifier **Sara Klingensmith** will judge members' photos for our annual Photo Contest. In addition to the traditional categories (Documentary, Pictorial and Judge's Option), Sara has added a new category called "Mushroom Selfies".

Here are the Photo Contest rules for this year:

- Deadline for Submissions: September 30, 2023
- Maximum of 5 Entries per WPMC member
- Submit high resolution JPEG files
- Rename images before submitting, using name and subject, e.g., "Joe Smith morel.jpg"
- Email entries to Sara Klingensmith at pamushroomclubphotos@gmail.com.
- Indicate in your email the desired category for each photo.

You must be a member of the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club in good standing to enter. Club dues must be up to date. Photos submitted by non-members will not be considered.

Entry Divisions

Mushroom Selfies (New!): Entries must be single, self-taken ("selfie") cell phone photos of you with at least one mushroom. You may also include other willing people, your pets, and other animals that happen to cross the background in the photo. You may use selfie sticks, but no other person may take the photo for you.

Pictorial: This division is for single photos that illustrate the beauty and variety of fungi in form and color. The objective is a photo suitable for display or illustration in a fine book. Judging criteria include consideration of both technical (focus, depth of field, exposure, lighting, color, absence of distracting elements) and artistic (composition, color, background, lighting) aspects.

Documentary: For single photographs especially suited as illustrations in a field guide or monograph, or for use in a lecture. Emphasis is placed on portrayal of key morphological characteristics such that the usefulness of the image as an identification aid is maximized.

Subjects may be shot in the field, laboratory or studio and the photographer has complete freedom to process, manipulate, or orient the specimen in any desired manner to achieve the goal. Close-ups of single features and photomicrographs are acceptable. Judging criteria will be the same as in the Pictorial category but they will be of secondary importance to the overall mycological utility of the photo. Accurate identification of the subject will be a consideration.

Judge's Option: For photos which do not fit into the Pictorial or Documentary divisions. Examples include fungi in an interesting situation, fungi with animals, people enjoying fungi.

Subject material: Organisms from the Myxomycota (slime molds), the classes Basidiomycetes and Ascomycetes of the Eumycota ("true fungi"), and Lichens are eligible. For Judge's Option, nearly anything goes, so long as the theme relates to fungi, and fungi are a key element of the photograph.

Use and copyright: WPMC may use your photographs on the website, newsletter and Mushroom Catalog and when we do, they will always be accompanied by your name as photographer (mentioned on the same page or caption of the image). WPMC will not allow the use of your photographs on other websites, although realistically we cannot prevent this. We will not sell or provide the images to others without your permission and the images remain the property and under the copyright of you the photographer and are used under license by the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club.

- Try to dig up three of the same species at different stages of development.
- Don't pick old mushrooms; leave them to drop spores.
- You are responsible for not getting lost. Find a buddy to search with.
- Only Club Mycologists and Identifiers should be used for identification and advice.
- Take notes and pictures to help you remember the mushrooms: location, habitat, etc.
- Whether you decide to eat a mushroom is ultimately your responsibility alone.
- Help Keep Our Parks Clean! When mushrooming, it's easy to bring a plastic grocery bag to collect cans, bottles or other trash you find. Trash cans are generally found nearby. If not, take it home for disposal.
