President's Message Barbora Batokova

As EARLY SUMMER kicked off, we've had a strong start to the mushroom season thanks to the warm spring, which was ranked as 13th warmest in the 130-year record. We've had some amazing sightings (and collections) of the magnificent *Boletus edulis* and related boletes. Unfortunately, the recent heat wave means mushroom growth will likely slow down until we receive some significant rainfall. Let's hope for some showers soon, so we can look forward to the emergence of chanterelles and more boletes. We had an excellent presentation by chanterelle expert **Rachel Swenie, PhD**, who taught us about chanterelles in our region and how to identify them. I definitely learned a few new species: *Cantharellus corallinus* which is very similar to *Cantharellus cinnabarinus*, and then *Cantharellus altipes*, which has ridges on the underside, unlike the widely encountered and collected *Cantharellus flavolateritius* (smooth chanterelle). Both of these species are likely unreported on iNaturalist, and I am looking forward to paying more attention to the chanterelles I find, consulting the "Key to Southern Appalachian Chanterelles" Rachel developed. As I write this, we're getting ready for our annual Mushroom Education Day at Powdermill Nature Reserve, and you can look forward to a report in the next newsletter. In July we'll welcome **Dana Driscoll, PhD** to teach us about medicinal fungi and double extraction tinctures, while in August you can look forward to **Bill Yule**, who will speak about fungal/animal interactions.

Interview with Mark Spear and Rebecca Miller

IKE OTHER EARLY WPMC members, **Mark Spear** and **Rebecca Miller** first learned about the club from a notice in the newspaper in 2000 and decided to attend Mushroom Mania at Beechwood Farms. They got lost and showed up late, but after being welcomed by **John Plischke III** and **Joyce Gross**, Mark and Rebecca were hooked.

Commercial spawn cultivators by trade, Mark and Rebecca met at the University of Maine and knew people in the mushroom industry at Penn State when they relocated to Kittanning, where they still do business and reside. At one of the WPMC meetings in 2001, they brought oyster mushroom grow kits and did the club's first meeting on cultivation for over 100 people. "Everyone was so excited! We loved the people! There were just so many interesting personalities and they all had one thing in common—mushrooms!" said Rebecca.

Admittedly not as good at field identification, Mark and Rebecca participated in the club by supplying the spawn for the annual cultivation meeting for years. "We were always interested in waste products and positive ways to reuse them," said Mark. Today they supply spawn to companies who turn it into biodegradable alternatives to plastic and other companies that grow the spawn into mycelium bacon and other meat-free ingredients. All from a lab just North of Pittsburgh!

City Nature Challenge Fungal Findings Recap

UNGI MAKE UP ONE of life's kingdoms, and yet we've documented less than ten percent of the species. Just like plants and animals, fungi are under threat like never before from habitat loss, pollution, and climate change. It is likely that many fungal species will become extinct before we can catalog and map them. By documenting fungal diversity, we can better understand their ecological roles, utilize their benefits in various fields, and ensure their conservation for future generations.

This is where events like the City Nature Challenge (held from April 26-29) come in. It brings together nature enthusiasts, citizen scientists, and professional researchers to observe and document biodiversity in urban areas. During this year's challenge in the Pittsburgh region, participants made a total of 10,041 observations, covering 1,755 different species across kingdoms. The event drew 641 observers and 556 identifiers, showcasing a collaborative effort to uncover and document urban biodiversity. Among these observations, fungi held a significant presence with 668 observations, covering 174 species.

Top Species Highlight

Several fungal species stood out during the challenge. The top observed species were:

- Allodus podophylli (Mayapple Rust) with 30 observations
- Cerioporus squamosus (Dryad's Saddle) with 29 observations
- *Flavoparmelia caperata* (Common Greenshield Lichen) with 23 observations

- Parmotrema hypotropum (Powdered Ruffle Lichen) with 12 observations
- Pluteus cervinus (Deer Mushroom) with 11 observations

To my surprise, the mayapple rust takes the top spot, though this fungal parasite, which forms tiny bright orange pustules on the underside of leaves of mayapple, is quite common. The top five also include some of the most common and widespread macrofungi in our area this time of year: the dryad's saddle, an edible polypore that grows on hardwoods (especially barkless elms) and the deer mushroom, a saprotrophic agaric that is edible, though not particularly delicious or sought-after! Finally, it's great to see two lichen species make the top five: the common greenshield lichen, a foliose lichen that grows on the bark of trees (and occasionally on rock) and the powdered ruffle lichen, which grows on hardwoods in open woods and roadsides in eastern US.

Recognizing Top Observers

The top fungal observers who significantly contributed to the event were largely members and current or former officers of our club! Thank you for your time and effort!

- Cherrie Cornmesser: 71 observations, 40 species identified
- Stephen Bucklin: 66 observations, 40 species identified
- Fluff Berger: 45 observations, 33 species identified
- Julie Travaglini: 33 observations, 24 species identified
- quarry-sanctuary: 28 observations, 9 species identified

The City Nature Challenge exemplifies the power of community science, bringing together people from all walks of life to contribute to our understanding of urban biodiversity. The fungal observations this year made up 6.65% percent of all observations, and as WPMC members, we should take pride in the significant participation this year!





WPMC Scholarship Committee Awards Grant

PRASANTH PRAKASH PRABHU is the latest recipient of the WPMC Scholarship Award to support his dissertation work at Clark University in Massachusetts. He will be using the funds to generate genome sequences of *Hohenbuehelia canadensis* and *Resupinatus alboniger* to investigate the nematode-trapping behaviors that are unique to each genus within *Pleurotaceae*. The genes and evolution associated with nematophagy in basidiomycetes are completely unknown, but recent studies are indicating that *Resupinatus* is a close relative to *Pleurotaceae* and therefore a great model for comparative phylogenomic analysis.

We look forward to hearing more about his research!

Lincoff Foray Guest Mycologists

Sigrid Jakob, President of the New York Mycological Society, will present "DNA Sequencing for Non-Scientists". DNA sequencing has become an integral part of modern mycology. It is not only helping with the classification of fungi but has revolutionized our understanding of the fungal tree of life. Sigrid's talk will take us through the many uses (and abuses) of DNA sequencing. It will explain how DNA sequencing works, explain the different methodologies (Sanger and Nanopore sequencing), what it takes to set up a

gles (sanger and Nanopore sequence lab, and how to integrate molecular methods with the documenting and collecting that mushroom clubs are already doing. It will also showcase the relevance of DNA sequencing to support the conservation of rare and threatened fungi. She'll finish by looking at some of the more interesting discoveries from her own and her club's collections that DNA sequencing has helped to uncover. This talk is targeted at everybody no scientific background required!



HANNAH HUBER

Hannah Huber, Conservation Mycologist for the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program, will discuss "Conserving our Fungal Heritage." In 1973, the Endangered Species Act was passed, just four years after fungi were recognized as a distinct Kingdom separate from plants, and apparently not enough time for the authors of the Act to think to include fungi. While two lichens achieved federal listing later, fungi have been mostly without protection. This talk will describe the status of fungal



conservation, key initiatives, and the role of subnational natural heritage programs (like Pennsylvania's) in assessing and monitoring fungal species. This talk will also highlight the work that is unfolding in Pennsylvania with the unmatched energy of the state's mycology community to carefully document species that may be rare, at risk of decline, or introduced and spreading.

WALT STURGEON

Walt Sturgeon, author of *Appalachian Mushrooms* and *Mushrooms of the Northeast*, will join us on Friday at Cook Forest and Saturday in Sewickley. Walt will help us to identify mushrooms and will discuss our finds on Saturday.

Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club Release and Indemnification Agreement

This Release and Indemnification Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into by and between the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club, as it is presently organized and may be later structured ("WPMC") and the undersigned Member (the "Member") on this _____ day of _____, 20____.

WHEREAS, WPMC is a non-profit educational organization that has as its principal purpose the sharing of mushroom-related information among its members; and

WHEREAS, all officers, directors, identifiers and members serve WPMC in a voluntary capacity and receive no remuneration for their services; and

WHEREAS, in cases where WPMC charges a fee for its forays, walks, lectures and other events (collectively "WPMC Events"), it is doing so only to cover its direct costs and does not operate in a for-profit capacity; and WHEREAS, the Member understands that there is inherent and unavoidable risk in outdoor activities relating to hunting and consuming wild mushrooms. These risks include but are not limited to the dangers of hiking in difficult terrain, the possibility of misidentifying a wild mushroom, and the possible allergic or toxic reaction that some individuals may have to otherwise edible mushrooms.

NOW THEREFORE, the Member hereby agrees to the following:

- 1. The Member assumes all risks associated with WPMC Events. The Member expressly acknowledges that it is the Member's sole responsibility to hike safely and to determine whether a wild mushroom may be consumed.
- 2. The Member releases, holds harmless, and indemnifies the WPMC, its officers, directors, identifiers, and representatives from any and all liability relating to any injury or illness incurred by the Member or the Member's family members as a result of participation in a WPMC Event.

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. If any portion of the Agreement is declared for any reason to be invalid or unenforceable, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision of the Agreement. This Agreement shall apply to all current and future WPMC events.
