HAT A START to the summer! $oldsymbol{\mathsf{V}}$ With all the rain we've had lately and the warm temperatures settling in, conditions are shaping up beautifully

for fungi to flourish—and for us to get out and enjoy a fantastic mushroom season.

Our annual Mushroom Education Day at Powdermill Nature Reserve was a resounding success. I'm thrilled to report we documented 59 different species—a wonderful testament to the great weather, the richness of our region, and the sharp eyes of our members. One of the most exciting finds of the day was Microstoma floccosum (pink fringed faery cup), a striking pastel-pink cup fungus with delicate white hairs—a rare and beautiful species that had many of us buzzing!

We've got plenty of walks planned in the coming months! This is shaping up to be one of those seasons where every outing offers something new to see and learn.

I'm also excited to share that our inaugural WPMC camping trip and foray is happening July 11-13 in collaboration with Oak Haven Mushroom Farm in Blairsville (Indiana County), organized by WPMC Identifier Dawn Wehman and led by WPMC Mycologist John **Plischke.** This promises to be a memorable weekend of funai!

Finally, I am happy to report that the state mushroom vote is on the horizon! We're anxiously awaiting a decision by the House Tourism, Recreation & Economic Development Committee on recognizing Ganoderma tsugae (hemlock varnish shelf) as the official Pennsylvania state mushroom. Stay tuned—this could be a big step for fungi awareness in our region!

Stay safe in the woods, be mindful of ticks, and as always—happy mushroomina!

JULY 15 - Medicinal/Culinary Mushrooms: Fantastic Fungi to Save Body, Mind, and Spirit

Dr. Michael Beug (virtual)

This talk will be in two parts:

PART 1: Psychotropic fungi deals briefly with various Amanita groups, where the principal toxins are muscimol and ibotenic acid. It then explores in-depth the species containing psilocybin and psilocin as the main active compounds and their use in dealing with PTSD, depression, and more.



PART 2: General medicinal/culinary fungi examines mushroom food value and nutrition and the vast range of potential functional foods and medicinal uses of fungi. Dr. Beug will describe mushroom use by individuals diagnosed with cancer and some incredible outcomes.

AUGUST 19 – What happens to our specimens: From the dehydrator to the iournal article

WPMC Mycologists John Plischke (left) and Garrett Taylor (right) will give you a behind-the-scenes tour of the latest lab protocol leveraging Oxford Nano-





pore. They will share what they've learned over the last several years, collecting mushroom specimens in the field and evaluating their DNA ITS fungal barcodes.

John and Garrett both started with the initial group of citizen scientists who began seriously documenting and sequencing for the original Fungal Diversity Survey (FUNDIS) project back in 2017. Subsequently, they have collected with the Hoosier Mushroom Society on their Summer and Fall state MycoBlitzes since 2020.

They've helped to keep WPMC MycoBlitzing, sequencing everything here which we can't be sure has been sequenced before. We first successfully tested a Nanopore MycoBlitz run at the 2022 Lincoff Foray with Stephen Russell, WPMC Mycologist Cara Coulter, and the club's help. John and Garrett played an instrumental role in the sequencing initiative at the last two NAMA Forays, each surpassing 1,000 collections.

New to Us: *Crepidotus* capitatocystidiatus and *C.* albissimus

THIS IS THE FIRST of hopefully many "New to Us" articles, introducing species that are not on the club's life list but have been identified and confirmed by DNA sequencing to be in Western PA.

I downloaded a list of species that have been DNA sequenced in the Western PA region from iNaturalist and compared the species to a maximal list of all possible species prepared by WPMC Mycologist **John Plischke** for the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and the WPMC life list. Our club's life list had not been updated with species identified by DNA from recent Lincoff forays and DNA barcoding events, an instance where procrastination was helpful!

Note that we are only interested in species that have a full scientific name or Latin binomial, not species that have temporary codes and could be undescribed. After cleaning up the list and removing duplicates, etc., there were 832 entries This list will be published on the club's website shortly. There are 8,113 species on the maximal list, of which 1,621 are on the club's life list. A comparison between the two iNat sequenced lists reports 367 species that are new to our lists and 63 that are on the maximal list but not yet on the club's life list.

Out of these 430 species, I have somewhat at random selected two *Crepidotus* species to report here. Looking at Index Fungorum, an online website that tracks nomenclature, there are 591 records or names of *Crepidotus* species and variants. Many have been redirected to another entry, as they are considered duplicates of an earlier description. Even so, there are over 300 active names on the list. A book, *North American Species of Crepidotus*, published in 1965, covers 125 species. But on the club's life list we only have seven species recorded in the area. Clearly there is a lot more to know!

Crepidotus capitatocystidiatus

Crepidotus capitatocystidiatus is the easier one of the two to document (if not pronounce), as the species was recently described from China. There is only one observation on iNaturalist, collected by **Stephen Russell** at the Mycological Association of Washington Sequanota Foray in the Laurel Highlands in 2023. The DNA analysis of the ITS barcode was one base pair different and not considered sufficient to split the Pennsylvania observation from the holotype. Given the lack of observations of *C. capitatocystidi*-

atus, we do not know its true range. It is clearly present both here and in China. If the species is cosmopolitan, then we would expect it to be found across Europe, too. In that case, the species would likely be reclassified, once older herbarium specimens are sequenced and C. capitatocystidiatus becomes a synonym to a prior publication. Another possibility is that it is a Chinese species that has been transported on packing material to North America and is now an invasive species. Time will tell.

How to identify *C. capitatocystidiatus*? The images on iNaturalist show a small specimen with white caps and light brown gills maturing to shades of yellow and brown. The published description compares the mushroom's colors to the **Ridgeway** color scheme which is a fascinating story in itself. The most distinguishing macro feature is a pleated or lobed cap, best shown in Photo 1.

The pleating is not as pronounced in the images of the holotype specimens, although it is mentioned in the description. Younger specimens show a short stem with clear villosity—long slender hairs—at the base. The caps are pubescent when young, covered in soft down or fine short hairs, but smooth when mature. The margin (edge of the cap) is described as weakly tomentose—densely matted or woolly hairs—at all stages of growth. Cap size is from 0.5 cm to 2.5 cm, so on the smaller size compared to *Crepidotus applanatus* (the "flat crep"). Microscopic verification will help with the identification. The spores are reported to be 6.2 \times 5.0 μm , guttiform (drop shaped) and covered by small irregular warts. The spore shape, more than the size, should help separate it from other common *Crepidotus* species. Refer to this publication for a full description: https://www.mdpi.com/2309-608X/10/10/710

Crepidotus albissimus

Crepidotus albissimus was published in 1943 in Mycologia "Additions to Florida Fungi" by William Murrill. We do not have a sequenced holotype for *C. albissimus*, so it may be a name that changes in the future. What we do have is a collection of observations with the same ITS barcode and a mushroom with distinctive features. All the observations for *C. albissimus* are on the eastern side of the USA. The first was collected by **Stephen Russell** at the 2022 Lincoff Foray walk in Cook Forest State Park and has been sequenced. A second sequenced observation was made at the same location by WPMC Mycologist **Cara Coulter** a year later.

This is another small *Crepidotus*, approximately 1 cm wide. Fresh specimens will be all white, both cap and gills, but it will darken to a light brown over time. The distinguishing macro feature is the silky fibrillose—tiny, threadlike fibers or strands—covered cap. This is clearly seen in Photo 2 by Cara. Microscopically, spores are reported as 5.3-7 x 3.5-4.5 µm ellipsoid or subovoid, smooth and pale brown. An accessible description is available in the *North American Species of Crepidotus* book.

That covers two "New to Us" species that we hope more club members will be able to find and identify in the future.

ALT Announces Nature on Wheels

OR ALMOST TWO YEARS. Allegheny Land Trust's Education Team has been working on something major. We teased the announcement a fair amount over the last six months, but we can finally shout it from the rooftops: Nature on Wheels is coming!

Nature on Wheels is a new initiative from ALT's Education Team designed to expand access to environmental education across the region. This innovative hybrid truckand-trailer system allows us to bring our programs directly to more—and more diverse—audiences, especially those traditionally excluded from environmental education. Reaching underserved communities is essential for promoting environmental justice and empowering residents to advocate for healthier, more sustainable environments.



ALLEGHENY **LAND TRUST**

These communities often experience higher exposure to pollution, fewer green spaces, and limited access to environmental resources. By bringing Nature on Wheels directly into these neighborhoods, we provide individuals with the knowledge and tools to engage in local decision-making, address environmental challenges, and build resilience to climate-related risks. Ultimately, this kind of outreach fosters a stronger connection to nature and inspires collective action for lasting, positive change.

The trailer was designed with the guidance of CannonDesign's Open Hand Studio and funded by American Eagle Outfitters Foundation, Arconic Foundation, Benedum Foundation, CannonDesign, Grable Foundation, HDR Inc., Rivers of Steel, and the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club. ALT's Education and Development teams worked together to raise more than \$225,000 to fund the creation and build-out of Nature on Wheels.

WPMC funding for this project will provide microscopes for the truck and allow us to bring mycology and the fascinating world of fungi to even more folks around the region. We look forward to brining Nature on Wheels to a future meeting!



City Nature Challenge 2025: Pittsburgh Region Results

THE 2025 CITY Nature Challenge took place from April 25-28, and the results were announced on May 5. The Pittsburgh Region included anyone using iNaturalist in Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Washington, and Westmoreland Counties during these dates. Those results were 10,328 observations by 559 people of 1,748 species.

Results for the category "Fungi including Lichens" were 810 observations by 142 observers of 199 species! The most-observed species was Dryad's Saddle, *Cerioporus squamosus*. WPMC members with the most species were: WPMC Identifier **Cherie Cornmesser** and WPMC Mycologist **Stephen Bucklin** with 54 each, WPMC Identifier **Jared White** with 23, WPMC Identifiers **Julie Travaglini** and **Dawn Wehman** with 22 each, and WPMC Mycologist **Richard Jacob** with 21.

Interview with Mary Jo Smiley

WHEN HIKING AND CAMPING, one sees a lot of mushrooms and even more once someone else starts pointing them out, says long-time WPMC member **Mary Jo Smiley**. "The *National Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Mushrooms* was my first book, but it was hard to learn from because of limited pictures."

That's what brought Mary Jo to join WPMC in 2005 and led to the large collection of mushroom books she has today. "Some of the better ones would be in the car all season. I was never good at memorizing names, and we didn't have Facebook or iNaturalist or the tools and resources we have today."

"I was thrilled to find the club. The gatherings and club walks were really an important part of how I learned. Seeing specimens in person and having someone tell me what they were was so much better than pictures. When I could, I would go out the day before our monthly meeting and bring mushrooms in, so they wouldn't be too decomposed."

Mary Jo has two Excalibur dehydrators and lots of mushrooms in storage. Lion's mane, *Hericium erinaceus*, was the first—but definitely not the last—of her favorites to come to mind. "I used to get tons of Chanterelles and Chicken of the Woods, *Laetiporus sulphureus*, and Hen of the Woods, *Grifola frondosa*, every year. So many sometimes that I'd be sore the next day from picking!" She's noticed more people coming to her favorite spots near Economy Boro and Wexford, "and I guess that's OK."

Dabbling in growing edible mushrooms has become her new fun thing to do. "I make sure I get to the cultivation meetings. I actually built myself a simple laminar flow hood, so I am playing with agar, spores and tissue cultures."

"I can feel confident about knowing what I'm eating and what I find, and it's fun to know something unique that not everyone has studied and learned about. I have been sharing my knowledge with friends I camp with, too." Mary Jo still gets out a few times a week to forage during the peak seasons. "Rain after a dry spell makes me want to go out," she smiles. "I know I should wait a few days after the rain, but it makes me want to go look and it makes a walk in the woods more fun."

HAVE MADE A few changes to the Photo Contest categories this year. Due to the popularity of the Pictorial category, I have split it into "Novice" and "Advanced." Mushroom Selfies will be absorbed by the Judge's Option. The Documentary category will stay the same. Here are the Photo Contest rules for this year:

- Deadline for Submissions: September 30, 2025
- Maximum of 5 Entries per WPMC member
- Submit high resolution JPEG files
- Rename images before submitting, using name and subject, e.g., "Joe Smith morel.jpg"
- Email entries to Sara Klingensmith at pamushroomclubphotos@gmail.com.
- Indicate in your email the desired category for each photo.

You must be a member of the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club in good standing to enter. Club dues must be up to date. Photos submitted by non-members will not be considered.

ENTRY DIVISIONS

Advanced Pictorial: This division is for single photos that illustrate the beauty and variety of fungi in form and color. The objective is a photo suitable for display or illustration in a fine book. Judging criteria include consideration of both technical (focus, depth of field, exposure, lighting, color, absence of distracting elements) and artistic (composition, color, background, lighting) aspects.

Novice Pictorial: This division is for single photos that illustrate the beauty and variety of fungi in form and color. The objective is a photo that shows the photographer learning to use focus, depth of field, and lighting.

Documentary: For single photographs especially suited as illustrations in a field guide or monograph, or for use in a lecture. Emphasis is placed on portrayal of key morphological characteristics such that the usefulness of the image as an identification aid is maximized. Subjects may be shot in the field, laboratory or studio and the photographer has complete freedom to process, manipulate, or orient the specimen in any desired manner to achieve the goal. Close-ups of single features and photomicrographs are acceptable. Judging criteria will be the same as in the Pictorial categories but they will be of secondary importance to the overall mycological utility of the photo. Accurate identification of the subject will be a consideration.

Judge's Option: For photos which do not fit into the Pictorial or Documentary divisions. Examples include fungi in an interesting situation, fungi with animals, people enjoying fungi, and mushroom selfies.

Subject Material: Organisms from the Myxomycota (slime molds), the classes Basidiomycetes and Ascomycetes of the Eumycota ("true fungi"), and Lichens are eligible. For Judge's Option, nearly anything goes, so long as the theme relates to fungi, and fungi are a key element of the photograph.

Use and Copyright: WPMC may use your photographs on the website, newsletter and Mushroom Catalog and when we do, they will always be accompanied by your name as photographer (mentioned on the same page or caption of the image). WPMC will not allow the use of your photographs on other websites, although realistically we cannot prevent this. We will not sell or provide the images to others without your permission and the images remain the property and under the copyright of you the photographer and are used under license by the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club.

- Bring drinking water and lunch
- Insect repellent
- Basket for collecting
- Knife for cutting mushrooms
- Wax or paper bags (no plastic) to keep mushrooms separated
- Whistle
- Compass
- Hand lens
- Cell phone & camera
- Notebook & pencil
- Field guide for identification
- Band-aids
- Garden hand-clippers
- Try to dig up three of the same species at different stages of development.
- Don't pick old mushrooms; leave them to drop spores.
- You are responsible for not getting lost. Find a buddy.
- Only Club Mycologists and Identifiers should be used for identification and advice.
- Take notes and pictures to help you remember the mushrooms: location, habitat, etc.
- Whether you decide to eat a mushroom is ultimately your responsibility alone.
- Help Keep Our Parks Clean! It's easy to bring a bag to collect cans, bottles or other trash you find. Trash cans are generally found nearby. If not, take it home for disposal.
