

THE WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA Mushroom Club is saddened by the news that on December 31, 2018, a WPMC Founder and Honorary Member, John R. Plischke, passed away at the age of 76.

John served as WPMC President in 2001 and received WPMC's President's Award in 2004. John was also active

in the Northeast Mycological Federation (NEMF) and North American Mycological Association (NAMA). His wife Becky, son John Plischke III, and daughter-in-law Kim Plischke have all been active WPMC members from the very beginning.

A memorial contribution in John's memory has been made to the Audubon Society of Western Pennsylvania.

Adam leads various classes and workshops related to plant and mushroom identification, wild food harvesting, nutritional and medicinal components of wild foods, the benefits of nature connection, and more.



He is an official WPMC Identifier and has served on WPMC's Board since 2016. Adam has also published a *Fun Guide to Fungi*, and his YouTube channel features over 100 instructional nature videos.

Fall Mushroom Hunting in Italy (and Beyond)

HAVE YOU EVER THOUGHT about mycological travel? I have been on these trips for ten years now, and they are not only educational, but great fun, and a good way to meet other American and European mushroom enthusiasts. In Italy, mushroom hunting is a deep-rooted tradition, and every small town seems to have its own mushroom club. Admittedly, these cultural ties are strongly linked to the kitchen. From an early age, kids go out into the local woods with a parent or grandparent and learn what is seasonally available and which mushrooms are edible—or not. They were "locavores" long before it had a name.

There are regional tours of Italy, which include daily mushroom hunting, guided by local mycologists and mushroom enthusiasts. Each morning, after several hours of meandering through some favorite hunting grounds, the group repairs to a local restaurant, where the day's findings are spread out on tables and identified, usually with a table-walk discussion by a local expert. This is typically followed by a two- to three-hour lunch and an afternoon of cultural activities (e.g., visiting a local museum, interesting town, winery, cheesemaker—tourist activities.) Maybe even a truffle hunt!

This autumn, Whatscookin' Italy tours will be leading two mushroom-hunting tours in northern Italy: the Emilia-Romagna (Bologna) and Piedmont (Turin) regions. The Piedmont tour will feature Britt Bunyard (editor of FUNGI magazine) as a guest mycologist. Also this year, there will be a mushroom tour to Croatia. Tours are generally ten days in length, with an optional three-day extension for more in-depth exploration of the area.

Mushrooms in the News

Polypore Extract May Help Save Bees

ACCORDING TO RESEARCH published last October, Paul Stamets of Fungi Perfecti, along with scientists from Washington State University and the USDA, tested extracts from the mycelium of polypores known to have antiviral properties on honey bees. Extracts from Fomes and Ganoderma reduced the levels of honey bee deformed wing virus and Lake Sinai virus within days, compared with control colonies. These findings indicate that honey bees may gain health benefits from fungi and their antimicrobial compounds.

The hope is that the results of this research will help dwindling honey bee colonies fight viruses that are known to play a role in colony collapse disorder. According to one of the authors, WSU professor Steve Sheppard, "We're excited to see where this research leads us. Time is running out for bee populations, and the safety and security of the world's food supply hinges on our ability to find means to improve pollinator health."

More Cases of Shiitake Dermatitis Reported

SHIITAKE (*LENTINUS EDODES*) DERMATITIS is a rare skin eruption that resembles whiplash marks and occurs after consumption of raw or insufficiently cooked shiitake mushrooms. The condition was first reported in Japan in 1977. Since 2006, new cases have been reported every few years, from around the world.

Shiitake dermatitis is caused by a toxic reaction to lentinan, a polysaccharide component of shiitake mushrooms which decomposes upon heating. The symptoms are dark red, almost purple welts all over the body, which usually begin about 48 hours after eating raw or undercooked shiitake mushrooms and last for about 10 days. Treatment generally consists of antihistamines and topical steroids.

In 2018, The Journal of Family Practice published an article about a 30-year-old male in Spain who presented with multiple linear streaks on his trunk and extremities. The patient told doctors that, four days earlier, he had eaten large quantities of lightly cooked shiitake mushrooms. The patient was diagnosed with flagellate shiitake mushroom dermatitis and was advised to avoid eating undercooked shiitake mushrooms in the future. To read the full article — CLICK HERE

The PA Biological Survey is a volunteer organization, with no dues or obligations. The MAP Technical Committee does not have regular meetings, and most of its work is conducted via email. Every mushroom club in the state is being asked to provide at least one liaison to join the MAP Technical Committee.



WPMC RECENTLY RECEIVED a new supply of Field Data Slips from the North American Mycoflora Project (NAMP). The new ID slips are very similar to WPMC's previous version, with one major difference: The ID number now appears three times, so that it can stay with the specimen as it goes through various processes in preparation for further analysis. The new ID slips will be stored at Beechwood Farms for WPMC's Identifiers and Mycologists to use on their mushroom walks. Important Walk & Foray Information

- Try to dig up three of the same species at different stages of development.
- Don't pick old mushrooms; leave them to drop spores.
- You are responsible for not getting lost. If you have a tendency to wander off, stick like glue to the others. We won't wait for you, and we won't come to look for you.
- Don't take the identification of the person standing next to you; they might not know as much as you do. Only Club Mycologists and Identifiers should be used for advice.
- The Walk Leader will tell you when to be back at the walk starting place, where the mushrooms will be put on paper plates and the Walk Identifier or Club Mycologist will put names on only the mushrooms they know well.
- Take notes and pictures to help you remember the mushrooms.
 You should go home and check books yourself.
- Whether you decide to eat a mushroom is ultimately your responsibility alone.
- Help Keep Our Parks Clean! When mushrooming, it's easy
 to bring a plastic grocery bag to collect cans, bottles or other
 trash you find. Trash cans are generally found nearby. If not,
 take it home for disposal.



Entry Divisions

PICTORIAL: This division is for single photos that illustrate the beauty and variety of fungi in form and color. The objective is a photo suitable for display or illustration in a fine book. Judging criteria include consideration of both technical (focus, depth of field, exposure, lighting, color, absence of distracting elements) and artistic (composition, color, background, lighting) aspects.

DOCUMENTARY: For single photographs especially suited as illustrations in a field guide or monograph, or for use in a lecture. Emphasis is placed on portrayal of key morphological characteristics such that the usefulness of the image as an identification aid is maximized. Subjects may be shot in the field, laboratory or studio and the photographer has complete freedom to process, manipulate, or orient the specimen in any desired manner to achieve the goal. Close-ups of single features and photomicrographs are acceptable. Judging criteria will be the same as in the Pictorial category but they will be of secondary importance to the overall mycological utility of the photo. Accurate identification of the subject will be a consideration.

JUDGE'S OPTION: For photos which do not fit into the Pictorial or Documentary divisions. Examples include fungi in an interesting situation, fungi with animals, people enjoying fungi.

SUBJECT MATERIAL FOR PICTORIAL AND DOCUMENTARY: Organisms from the Myxomycota (slime molds) and the classes Basidiomycetes and Ascomycetes of the Eumycota ("true fungi") are eligible. For Judge's Option, nearly anything goes, so long as the theme relates to fungi, and fungi are a key element of the photograph.

USE AND COPYRIGHT: WPMC may use your photographs on the website, newsletter and Mushroom Catalog and when we do, they will always be accompanied by your name as photographer (mentioned on the same page or caption of the image). WPMC will not allow the use of your photographs on other websites, although realistically we cannot prevent this. We will not sell or provide the images to others without your permission and the images remain the property and under the copyright of you the photographer and are used under license by the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club.
