Pre-Foray Walk at Cook Forest

THIS YEAR'S WALKS AT COOK FOREST were split between Shelters 1 and 2, with walk leaders WPMC Past President **Richard Jacob** and WPMC Identifier **Adam Haritan** respectively, and a roughly equal number of participants. Unfortunately, due to the short notice that participants received, not everyone could make it. We will look at changing signup to first-come first-served, so that people receive plenty of notification in the future. Despite the lower number of participants than expected, both groups found plenty of mushrooms. As with other locations where we have walked this year, we may not have found a lot of any one species, but we did find plenty of variety.

At Shelter 1, we found very few *Amanita* and *Cortinarius* species. We did find a number of *Bolete* species, including *Boletus edulis*, which made up for it. Many of us found a colony of *Cordyceps militaris* during the walk, resulting in a hunt for the bodies. The other common *Cordyceps* at the location, *Tolypo-cladium ophioglossoides* (Goldenthread *cordyceps*), was also found further into the walk on a slope. There were quite a few *Lycoperdon perlatum* (Gem-studded Puffballs) around, too.

From Shelter 2, Adam reported that, despite the relatively dry conditions, a decent number of species were found within the two-hour walk. The most prolific species were False Chanterelles (*Hygrophoropsis aurantiaca*) and Dotted-Stalk *Suillus* (*Suillus*)



granulatus/weaverae). Surprisingly, no honey mushrooms were found on our walk, and the usual diversity of *Cortinarius* was lacking as well. Still, most of the major groups of fungi were represented at the identification table, and WPMC has a few new species to add to its life list.

Other interesting species of note were *Melanophyllum haematospermum* and *Stereum gausapatum* (Bleeding Oak Crust), both of which had been found at Hartwood Acres but not many other locations. A fun find is *Pseudohydnum gelatinosum* (Cat's tongue), a transparent toothy jelly mushroom. Finally, *Ischnoderma benzoinum* was identified. According to Gary Lincoff, Cook Forest was the only known Eastern location for this typically Western species.

A few of us explored the Fire Tower region with its oak forest. We found a few more species of mushrooms but conditions were very dry, and we did not see many of the species we typically find in the area.

Species lists were entered by Adam Haritan and Richard Jacob. Species were identified by WPMC Identifier Cara Coulter, Adam Haritan, Richard Jacob, Judy Mackenroth, Tom McCoy (from Washington, DC), WPMC Mycologist La Monte Yarroll, and others. More Than 100 Species Found at Lincoff Foray in North Park

THIS YEAR'S OFFICIAL GARY LINCOFF Foray on Saturday, September 12 at North Park, was split between three walks in the morning and an online interview in the afternoon, due to the ongoing pandemic. The normal events were sorely missed, especially the mushroom feast and the gathering of mycologicial expertise that we normally have. We held walks at Devils Elbow, the swimming pool area, and Wyoming Shelter, led by WPMC Identifiers **Fluff Berger, Richard Jacob** and **Cara Coulter**, respectively. Each walk had five or so participants.

The weather was nice, and there had been some rain over the first couple of weeks of September, setting things up nicely as far as the mushrooms went. For about the first time this year in the Pittsburgh region, we found an abundance of *Amanita* and *Bolete* species. Although there were only three walks and fewer than 20 people involved, we still found and identified over 100 different species. This year was not the lowest number of species found; both 2002 and 2010 were lower, with around 70 species each time, due to very dry weather proceeding the foray.

We expect that there would have been many more species discovered, had it been a normal foray with additional walks and more people looking. Cara Coulter at the Wyoming Shelter walk added, "Found a nice log filled with fresh *Laetiporus sulphureus* for our walk members to enjoy. A lovely walk filled with plenty of mushrooms. Highlight of the walk was finding *Xanthoporia radiata*, a beautiful shelf fungus with orange hues."

As always, thanks to the walk leaders and Club members who joined us for the morning and allowed us to continue our 20-year streak of collecting at the Lincoff Foray in North Park. Species list entered by **Fluff Berger, Cara Coulter,** and **Richard Jacob**. Species identified by **Fluff, Cara**, and **Richard**, along with WPMC Mycologist **La Monte Yarroll** and others.

Two FunDiS Opportunities for WPMC Members

THE NORTH AMERICAN MYCOFLORA PROJECT IS NOW Fungal Diversity Survey, or FunDiS for short. The mission of FunDiS is to equip citizen and professional scientists with the tools to document the diversity and distribution of fungi across North America. FunDiS is offering WPMC members two new opportunities to participate.



FunDiS Part 1: iNaturalist Project

FUNDIS HAS CREATED A LARGE iNaturalist database of high-quality observations of fungi to support proj-

ects in mycology and conservation. Two WPMC Mycologists, John Plishcke and Garrett Taylor, are Managers for this project. If you're not on iNaturalist yet, join now—it's free. Then join the FunDiS project here:

Start adding your observations. If you already have a lot of good ones, follow the instructions for bulk transfer. And observe these FunDiS minimum quality standards:

- Observations should be of mushrooms large enough to be seen without a microscope, that have been observed in North America. No lichens or slime molds!
- Images need to be clear, well-lit, in focus, and the mushroom needs to be relatively large in the picture so its details can be seen clearly.
- No old or heavily damaged specimens.
- We want to see the cap, the pore/gill surface, the stem including the base, bulb or volva (if applicable). Any staining, discoloration or milk/latex should also be shown.
- Unless its size is clear, add a ruler or a common item (e.g. knife, pen or your hand) for scale.
- There should be a clue to the host or substrate, e.g. if it grows under a specific tree, show the leaf or needles of that tree next to the mushroom, or take a separate picture.
- Anything else that's noteworthy (e.g. smell, taste) should be added in the Notes section.
- Take several pictures of one specimen or put a couple of fungi in the same shot where we see different parts of the specimens.

FunDiS Part 2: Introductory Sequencing Grants

ARE YOU INTERESTED in getting your finds sequenced but not sure how to get started? Then apply for a starter grant for five specimens, while funds are available. Just follow these three steps:

- 1. Register a project
- 2. Complete a survey
- 3. Apply for a grant

Start slowly and learn FunDiS protocols along the way. Once you're ready, apply for a DNA sequencing grant here:

Important Walk & Foray Information

- Try to dig up three of the same species at different stages of development.
- Don't pick old mushrooms; leave them to drop spores.
- You are responsible for not getting lost. If you have a tendency to wander off, stick like glue to the others. We won't wait for you, and we won't come to look for you.
- Don't take the identification of the person standing next to you; they might not know as much as you do. Only Club Mycologists and Identifiers should be used for advice.
- The Walk Leader will tell you when to be back at the walk starting place, where the mushrooms will be put on paper plates and the Walk Identifier or Club Mycologist will put names on only the mushrooms they know well.
- Take notes and pictures to help you remember the mushrooms. You should go home and check books yourself.
- Whether you decide to eat a mushroom is ultimately your responsibility alone.
- Help Keep Our Parks Clean! When mushrooming, it's easy to bring a plastic grocery bag to collect cans, bottles or other trash you find. Trash cans are generally found nearby. If not, take it home for disposal.

Walks & Forays Check List:

- Bring a buddy or two. **Do not forage alone!**
- Dress for the weather, carry a rain poncho
- □ Bring drinking water and lunch
- Insect repellent
- Basket for collecting
- □ Knife for cutting mushrooms
- Wax or paper bags (no plastic) to keep mushrooms separated
- Whistle
- Compass
- Hand lens
- Cell phone & camera
- Notebook & pencil
- □ Field guide for identification
- Band-aids
- Garden hand-clippers
