## Northeast Rare Fungi: Fistulina radicata

VERY SEPTEMBER THE Mycological Association of Washington, DC (MAW) holds its annual Camp Sequanota weekend in Somerset County. At this year's Sequanota foray, I was leading a morning walk at a new location. I had researched different possible sites close to the foray using Google Maps and then scouted them out a month before the event.

Bens Creek comes down the mountain surrounded by Eastern Hemlock and joins North Fork flowing into the North Fork reservoir. I thought it looked very similar to the environment at Linn Run. The group of assembled mushroom enthusiasts drawn from across Pennsylvania and Washington, DC and its surrounds fanned out through the forest to see what treasures of the fungal kind we could find.

We were fortunate that the North Fork reservoir area had received a couple of inches of rain in the two weeks before the foray and there was an abundance of mushrooms, from tiny *Marasmius* growing on fallen sticks to Corals sprouting from the needle duff and the occasional bright orange of a *Cordyceps militaris* (don't forget to dig for the body). Plenty of gilled mushrooms, too. Further away from the creek the forest turned to mixed hardwood and some conifers. The range of tree species in the area resulted in a high diversity of fungal species.

I collected over 60 specimens at Bens Creek North Fork. When we returned to Camp Sequanota, a couple of the foray mycologists came over to see what had been brought in. One of the finds quicky drew some interest. I did not recognize it, but I had brought in one of the Fungal Diversity Survey (FUNDIS) Northeast Rare Fungi Challenge species. These are species that are rare, underdocumented, or potentially threatened species reported to be in the Northeast.

Sitting at number 16 was *Pseudofistulina radicata*. It looks a little bit like *Fistulina hepatica*, the beefsteak fungus, and grows on dead hardwood with a key feature: the tubes that make up the underside are not fused together like a bolete but are individually discrete. When you use a magnifying lens or take a macro photo you can see the individual tubes. You can also distinguish *P. radicata* by the browner cap surface and rooting stipe. The specimen was quickly selected for DNA sequencing, so I was not able to take better pictures of it. However, the photos below by **Michael Kuo** beautifully illustrate the details.

When you're out in the woods, examine the area carefully before moving on. Often the more nondescript mushrooms are the unknown ones that hold a lot of interest for DNA sequencing. Every now and again you can find rare mushrooms, but some people

find more rare mushrooms than others, so it's not just luck. The one area I need to work on is taking better pictures of my finds in the field as you never know what it will be.

Good luck to all the future foray attendees and may you bring back the rarest of specimens!

## **IUCN Red List:** Rhodotus palmatus

NOT ONCE, but twice during October, WPMC members found a mushroom on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List: the Wrinkled Peach, *Rhodotus palmatus*. Its conservation status is "near threatened".

On October 5, **Marissa Kolarosky** found *R. palmatus* at Boyce Mayview Park in Upper St. Clair. She didn't know what it was until she posted it on iNaturalist. The very next day, WPMC Identifier **Julie Travaglini** found another one at Dead Man's Hollow.

R. palmatus appears on the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program (PNHP) list of Underdocumented Fungi of Pennsylvania. If you find one of these species, notify PNHP, post photos on iNat or Mushroom Observer, and reach out to a WPMC Identifier or Mycologist for identification assistance.





T WAS ANOTHER great year for the Cook Forest Pre-Foray Walk. We decided to again perform DNA analysis on many of the foray specimens, but this time we took a more laid-back approach and focused on our attendees, which worked out great.

We had about the same attendance as last year, which was 50-70 people, including our guest speakers, respected and passionate mycologist and president of the New York Mycological Society **Sigrid Jakob**, and the bright, enthusiastic PA Conservation Mycologist **Hannah Huber**. Also in attendance were MAW Program Chair **Tom McCoy** and author of *Appalachian Mushrooms*, **Walt Sturgeon**. We also had our own club Mycologists **John Plischke**, **Garrett Taylor**, **Kim Plischke**, **La Monte Yarroll**, **Stephen Bucklin**, and **Cara Coulter**, along with many of our club Identifiers.

Thankfully the weather was comfortable, but it was a painfully dry year at our Cook Forest Foray. This certainly didn't make it any less enjoyable. Even still, we managed to find over 180 species of fungi. It was wonderful to see how enthusiastic our attendees were and, of course, they brought back some wonderful finds. Some of the highlights are:

- A rare treat with a unique looking species called Wynnea americana (Moose Ears) was found this year by Karen Beall.
- We found *Chromosera cyanophylla*, a gorgeous fungus with bright pink gills.
- A very small unknown species of Typhula, a thin threadlike fungus, was found.
- Cudoniella sp-PA01 was found again this year. This species
  was found last year and, with sequencing, we found it to be
  a species that was novel to all DNA repositories. This means
  that it is either a completely new species or one that has never
  been sequenced before.
- Some very interesting and unknown species of entomopathogenic fungi were found by some of our members.
- Also found was a cluster of interesting unknown tiny brown ascomycetes. Can't wait to see what the DNA results show on this specimen.

So many were enthusiastic about submitting their specimens for DNA. I'm really looking forward to the results! I'm sure there will be a few first sequences and can't wait to see what our members found!

## Fluorescent Foray 2024

N THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 19, as the sun was setting, a group of 31 mycophiles gathered at the parking lot near the Log Cabin Inn Environmental Learning Center in Cook Forest State Park to embark on our 4th annual pre-pre-foray fluorescent walk. This was our first time hosting the evening walk in the Forest Cathedral area, a part of the park with impressive stands of old growth white pine and hemlock trees. After a short introduction to the area by Environmental Education Specialist **Dale Luthringer** and an overview of fluorescence and the equipment we were using, we hit the trails.

Dry conditions meant our fungal finds were perhaps fewer and farther between, but a short distance down the trail into the Forest Cathedral there was a beautiful fruiting of *Climacocystis borealis* on a large hemlock tree. While this polypore didn't have a strong glow, something else on the tree (perhaps an algae or slime mold?) gave off a beautiful orange glow.

As we continued among the towering hemlock and pine trees along Ancient Forest Trail, we continued to find fungi. The most impressive fluorescent species included 2-3 different *Russula* mushrooms and *Lactifluus deceptivus*. On a fallen tree we found a brightly glowing lichen, *Ochrolechia arborea*, which is a relatively plain gray crust under normal light. Although fungi were our main targets, we found many more glowing millipedes than we did mushrooms. Many of the millipedes we discovered were deceased, and a handful were in the characteristic *pose* millipedes take when they've been infected by *Arthrophaga myriapodina*.

Eventually we worked our way down the hill to Tom's Run. In this area we found some bright blue Cladonia squamosa lichens on

fallen logs. We then crossed the new bridge and walked back to where we started. All in all, we found a decent number of mushrooms considering the drought conditions, and it was a beautiful night to be out in the forest.

N SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, about 120 mushroom enthusiasts including registrants, volunteers, and speakers, attended the 24th annual Gary Lincoff Foray. The all-day event was a success with engaging speakers, delicious food, and a great turnout despite overall dry conditions and a new location.

For the first time in years, the event was held outside of North Park at the Economy Borough Fire Hall. The weather for the day was clear but warm, and everyone was grateful for the air conditioning in the fire hall. The location also offered the opportunity for eight new walks in the nearby area within about a 10-minute drive. As usual, club Identifiers and Mycologists led walks, helping club regulars and newcomers alike through the new walk areas. Despite the overall dry summer leading up to the Foray, many mushrooms were still found and brought back to the landing tables to be identified.

As tables started to fill with mushrooms after the morning walks, Knock About Coffee served caffeinated refreshments at their food truck stationed outside. Mike Henry and his kitchen crew provided a wide range of mushroom-based soups, and Espo **Wilcox** cooked his mushroom noodle stir fry on his wok outside. Nearby, the cultivation table was busy making mushroom grow kits inoculated with Lion's Mane spawn for all in attendance. Inside, the sales table was filled with a generous assortment of mushroom books and new club T-shirts, while auction tables bore an array of mushroom-related paraphernalia.

After lunch, Sigrid Jakob, President of the New York Mycological Society, explained "DNA Sequencing for Non-Scientists", an important topic as WPMC looks to continue and expand the effort with the DNA sequencing of collected mushroom species in the area. Afterward, Hannah Huber, Conversation Mycologist for the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program, spoke on "Conserving our Fungal Heritage" and the work being done in Pennsylvania to assess and monitor fungal species.

After the speaker sessions, Espo returned to his wok outside for the cooking demonstration, showcasing the mushroom noodle stir fry he shared earlier in the day. Then Dawn Wehman led the first ever Mushroom Jeopardy, which provided a fun way to engage the group with a competition on mushroom identification.

Not to disappoint, the Mushroom Feast was the star of the show. Countless dishes and desserts were prepared and donated, many with foraged mushrooms. To put it mildly, "you had to be there" to understand the full breadth of the culinary talent of this club and hard work of the kitchen crew. Appropriately, Walt Sturgeon, an experienced mycologist and friend of the club, led the table walk to end the day.

Countless people volunteered or helped in some way to make this event the success it was. The Foray Committee thanks everyone who attended or participated and looks forward to seeing you again in 2025!
